# Letter from the City Manager



Dear Commerce City Community Members,

With 2023 now behind us, it is with a profound sense of pride and optimism that I reflect on the strides we continue to make together. Like our community as a whole, the city as an organization experienced remarkable growth, change, and achievements last year while also facing challenges and obstacles along the way. Our staff continues to rise to the occasion every day as we strive to meet and exceed the expectations of our community and the City Council.

In this report, we are thrilled to share some of the organization's key accomplishments in 2023. We took guidance from City Council's goals to develop the city's first multiyear strategic plan, which will guide our efforts through 2028. We have welcomed a sizeable number of new employees to help our workforce achieve desired service levels, establishing new divisions like Community Well-Being Division and Energy, Equity, and the Environment to address community needs. Our dedication to economic development has been unwavering, supporting the creation and retention of more than 500 jobs and over \$110 million in new capital investments to invigorate our local economy. We introduced two new online systems; one to streamline permitting processes, cutting the review time for new commercial and residential development in half, and the other to help residents and businesses submit concerns or questions.

Our journey in developing the Parks, Recreation, and Golf (PRG) Master Plan, coupled with extensive parks repair and replacement projects exceeding \$300,000, is a testament to our dedication. With over 61,000 documented points of contact, utilizing 10 different outreach methods including emails, interviews, and in-person events, and convening across five Boards and Commissions meetings, your involvement has been the cornerstone of this endeavor.

Our Public Works team showed exemplary resilience and innovation, responding to two major flood events by not only restoring, but also improving our infrastructure to mitigate future risks. Similarly, the Police Department has been proactive in bolstering public safety services, adapting to the needs of our expanding community including the introduction of the flock camera safety system. This technology, covering a 3.5 square mile section of the city, alerts police within 60 seconds of any gunshots, pinpointing their location within 100 feet. Coupled with our approach to community policing, we enhance our ability to better protect residents.

Facing challenges with vigor and integrity is a cornerstone of my approach as your City Manager. I am committed to fostering an environment that encourages constructive dialogue, the expression of diverse ideas, and the delivery of exceptional services for our community. We are aiming to be a city that is efficient and effective, collaborative and innovative, and transparent and accountable.

I am honored to lead such a dedicated team and to serve the vibrant community of Commerce City. As we continue to look forward in 2024, I am filled with excitement for the possibilities that await us. As we continue working to ensure prosperity and well-being for all our residents, I thank you for your continued support and collaboration. Let us embrace the future with confidence and enthusiasm, for it is together that we will achieve greatness.

#### Commerce City At-A-Glance







935 total employees In 2023, the City of Commerce City welcomed **344 new employees:** 126 full-time staff and 218 variable-hour employees.

#### Community Well-Being



The city welcomed the new Community Well-Being Division, which provides services previously only offered at the county level. The team includes a manager and community navigators who focus on assisting seniors, families, and the local homeless population. This team coordinates information and referral services, outreach, and programming to reach individuals and families needing services and support.

Community Well-Being's 2023 efforts included large resource fairs with local churches, partnerships for free transportation with Via Mobility, giveaways for school supplies and meals, housing 23 residents, and assisting 36 residents with eviction prevention.




# **Community Response Team**



In May 2023, the city created a Community
Response Team (CRT) to promote crossdepartmental collaboration through the Police
Department, Community Development, Public
Works, and Parks, Recreation, and Golf to address
public concerns, outreach, and provide educational
resources in the community. Through the CRT,
322 violations and/or issues were identified and
resolved, creating a streamlined process to address
issues in the city more quickly.

#### **Economic Development**

- Helped create and retain 509 total jobs and \$110.5 million in new capital investments.
- Hosted the Business Appreciation Awards Breakfast after a three-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The event recognizes businesses, individuals, and organizations that contribute to Commerce City's economic vitality.
- Supported new business investment through expansion or attraction of organizations including Intsel Steel, Boise Cascade, iGo Realty, and Doka USA.



#### **Public Works**



- The School Traffic Calming project included the installation of 62 speed tables, humps, and cushions at over 20 schools to increase pedestrian safety.
- The 2023 asphalt pavement management program included mill & overlay of 34 streets, totaling approximately 17 lane miles.
- Installed **2.4 miles of new bicycle lanes** through the 2023 annual striping program.
- Responded successfully to two major flood events that closed E. 96th Avenue and Highway 2, resulting in increased capacity.



# **Building Safety**



Building Safety staff received over **30 building-related certifications.** 



Over 17,000 residential inspections and over 7,000 non-residential inspections performed.

The Building Code Effectiveness Grading Schedule rates public



building code agencies from 1 to 10 based on their effectiveness in hazard mitigation, with 1 being the highest ranking and 10 the lowest. We received an updated Verisk ISO Rating with a score of 3 for commercial and 4 for residential.

The Building Safety Division has created its first internal strategic plan to improve our division and to better serve our community.

The Recreation Division continues to see strong registrations and participation in organized sports and activities.

Recreation partnered with various departments and hosted the inaugural Commerce City Wild for Life Triathlon.

Parks completed nearly \$300,000 in repair/replacement projects in 2023, including:

- Resurfacing/painting of basketball courts and futsal pitches
- Replacement of site furnishings (tables, benches, trashcans, etc.)
- Playground repairs and surfacing material replacement
- Tree and plant replacements
- Soft surface trail repair
- Park signage replacement

# **Planning**



- Introduced a pilot program to reduce review times in conjunction with the Center for Innovation
- Refined process to support quicker pre-application meetings for applicants
- Began Land Development Code update process
- Completed 95 projects, including 31 residential and 23 commercial

- Re-launched the city's participation in the National Community Survey to collect valuable resident feedback about city services and organized numerous town hall meetings and community input opportunities.
