Staff held the bi-weekly meeting with Commerce City Workforce Pathway partners and discussed recruitment for the Commerce City Promise and GED programming for Spring, engagement of new partners, and growing employer engagement. Staff also met with and toured Stout Street exploring opportunities for collaboration on GED programming.

A member of the team began participation in LEAD Metro North. LEAD is a 39-year-old leadership and business engagement program. The program, led by AC-Rep, cultivates north metro leaders to serve on serve on Boards and Commissions and enhance the region's economic vitality. Participants represent a broad and diverse cross-section of business, government, and non-profit industries. Participants complete a nine-month program that pairs leadership training and engagement with business and nonprofits through full day site visits.

Staff met with Elasticity and the marketing team. The first opportunity to review strategies proposed for the public relations and advertising campaign by Elasticity will be on 9/22.

Participants include nonprofit professionals, business leaders, educators, residents, and public sector employees committed to the city's growth and vitality.

DID YOU KNOW?

The value of non-residential building permits issued by Commerce City has already exceeded both 2023 and 2024, and these numbers are only through the end of August!

Teams regularly patrol the city's streets, roadways and rights-of-way (ROW), to identify and remove any items that pose a hazard to drivers in our city. Once teams pick up any tires, crews take them to the recycling center to promote environmental sustainability.
- This week, Hot Shot Teams responded to a report submitted through the city's AccessC3 system, regarding a large furniture dump near 60th Avenue and Dexter Street. The team acted quickly to remove the debris and break down the furniture, helping to prevent potential contamination.

Public Works Updates

Preservation and Safety

 This week, Parks' teams planted six new trees in efforts to promote environmental health at Prairie Gateway Open Space.
 Teams used a skid steer and auger to plant the new trees along the trailhead. Staff will continue hands-on maintenance during the cooler temperatures to ensure the trees are properly watered and maintained.





Streets

- Sweeping and Stormwater teams continue their work managing and maintaining our drains and roads throughout the city.
- Stormwater teams conducted inspections and continuously monitor the city's stormwater drains to ensure that stormwater control measures are effective and properly installed. So far year-to-date, Stormwater teams estimate to have inspected 1,101 inlets throughout the city, with 660 maintenance inspections to the inlets. These totals are only expected to continue to increase with the lower temperatures.
- The Streets team completed a striping project on 88th Avenue between Highway 2 and Tamarac Street. This is repainting all double yellow lines in this area.
- In addition to the striping project on 88th Avenue and Tamarac Street, crews will be completing a similar striping project on 104th Avenue and Tower Road. The team is repainting all lines in the corners of the intersection, the spaces between turn lanes and skip lanes. Crews will complete this project this week.
- In preparation for the 2025-2026 snow season, Streets staff and other seasonal operators completed their annual "Snow Rodeo" to help staff get equipment ready to be used for a potentially busy snow season. During this rodeo, staff are trained on operating snow removal equipment efficiently and safely, while ensuring the snow removal equipment is functional and safe for operators and motorists on the city's roads.
- When snow arrives in Commerce City, visit <u>snowtrooper.c3gov.com</u> to see in live-time where the city's snowplows are on our city roads.

Parks Operations

- A strong windstorm on Tuesday afternoon downed one maple tree by Fairfax Parks', Field Three. During routine daily morning inspections, staff reported the damage and promptly removed the tree and the down branches.
- Teams continued with regular day-to-day maintenance throughout the city. This week, teams completed ballfield maintenance for usages throughout the weekend at Pioneer Park. Crews pruned shrub beds, blew off the leaves at Veteran's Memorial Park, and removed the weeds and pruned the trees at Eagle Pointe Recreation Center. Teams aim to complete these tasks daily to ensure all visitors have an enjoyable experience when visiting city-maintained sites.







 Parks teams have finished their work on the Fairfax park court resurfacing. A local contractor added new concrete at the courts, then Parks' crews painted them.



— Mowing teams continued their work this week, mowing and removed trash throughout all the city's right-of-way's (ROW). Teams followed the city-established schedule route 3 and picked up a total of 40 bags. Crews continued with herbicide maintenance operations at the city's Municipal Services Center, applying 80 gallons of mixed herbicide throughout the area.

Event recap: Fishing Frenzy Derby

On Saturday, Sept. 13, the Parks, Recreation, and Golf's Youth Services Outdoor Program staff hosted the 18th annual Fishing Frenzy Derby at the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge.

We had some amazing partners, including the Wildlife Refuge, Friends of the Front Range, Bass Masters, Cherry Creek Reservoir, Bluff Lake, and our very own Commerce City Park Rangers, who came out to support us. We would like to give special thanks to Friends of the Front Range for purchasing fishing poles with the GOCO grant, allowing us to provide every participant with a fishing pole. We had 65 youth participants ages 5 to 15 years old take part in the fishing derby, and about 25 fish were caught. The biggest fish caught was a carp measuring approximately 5.6 inches. It was a great event and received many positive reviews from participants and partners.
