Residents who are interested in running for a seat on the City Council can begin the process by picking up nomination petitions starting at 8 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 5, in the City Clerk's Office at the Civic Center, 7887 E. 60th Ave. Completed nomination petitions must be submitted no later than 5 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 25.

To help inform prospective candidates, the city will host a candidate information session on Tuesday, Aug. 5, at 6 p.m. at the Civic Center. While attendance is not required, this session offers valuable insight into the municipal election process and the role of elected officials in Commerce City's government.



Two internal candidates were recently promoted to serve in director roles on the city staff. Learn more about the organization at c3gov.com.





ACT programs help with home maintenance and clean-up

COMMERCE CITY IS DEDICATED to enhancing residents' quality of life through the Advancing Commerce City Together (ACT) Program. Supported by federal grant funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), this initiative addresses key needs, including career training, infrastructure improvements, and community well-being.

Applications are still being accepted from qualifying residents for help with home clean-up and repair needs, including code compliance assistance, home modifications and minor repairs.

The Code Compliance Assistance program area helps residents who are experiencing financial hardships or disabilities that make it challenging to resolve property code violations. The program can help with violations, including but not limited to:

- Overgrown weeds
- Low-hanging branches
- Accumulated trash
- Brush piles
- Outdoor storage The Home Modifications



and Minor Repairs programs can help pay for vital home repairs. This program assists low- to moderate-income Commerce City homeowners with essential home repairs, improvements, and accessibility modifications. Examples of the types of projects supported by this program include:

- Siding, doors, windows, and roof replacement
- Furnace and water heater replacement
- Electrical work
- Fencing, exterior painting, and ADA accessibility improvements Homeowners earning at or below 100% of the Area Median Income (AMI) can apply now. For more details or to apply for these programs, visit **c3gov.com/ACT.**

2025 Pavement Maintenance Projects Underway

THE CITY'S ANNUAL PAVEMENT MAINTENANCE PROGRAM is underway in 2025, with a series of street improvements scheduled across the city through the end of August.

Roads are being repaired using a mill and overlay method, which involves removing the top layer of the street and resurfacing it with fresh pavement. Impacts of this process typically include lane closures, areas of rough pavement, and lower speed limits. This work rarely calls for street closures. The momentum we've gained over the summer lays the foundation for a strong start.

Over break, we proudly announced the official name of our new junior high: Summit Heights Junior High School, home of the Bison. Establishing our school's identity is an important step in cultivating pride and belonging among our students. I am also proud to share that Adams 14 teacher salaries now rank in the top 5% in the state of Colorado.

This achievement reflects our deep commitment to recognizing and retaining the dedicated educators who drive our district forward.

I am genuinely excited to embark on this new school year, and most of all, I look forward to seeing our students thrive once again. I am confident that 2025-2026 will be one for the books! Whether this is your first or final year in Adams 14, let's make it unforgettable. Let's keep striving for the summit together, Fourteeners!






Learn about free dementia support resources at Resource Round-Up

Clear out your old tires for free

COMMERCE CITY RESIDENTS have a chance to safely and responsibly dispose of their old tires, free of charge, at the city's annual Tire Recycling Event on Saturday, Aug. 16.

Held at the Municipal Service Center (8602 Rosemary St.), this one-day event provides an easy way to recycle up to eight passenger vehicle tires per household. To participate, residents must bring valid proof of Commerce City residency.



This free program helps reduce

illegal dumping and promotes environmental responsibility. All collected tires will be shredded and processed into tire-derived fuel, an energy source that gives used tires a second life.

Important guidelines:

- Rims must be removed before drop-off
- No commercial, heavy equipment, or tractor tires
- Tires only, no other waste materials accepted
- Valid proof of residency required

COMMERCE CITY PET OWNERS will have two opportunities this August to get your furry friends the care they need: a low-cost vaccination clinic for the general public on Aug. 2 and a free pet clinic for low-income and unhoused residents on Aug. 9.

Low-Cost Shot Spot Vaccination Clinic

The Commerce City Police Department is partnering with Spay Today Healthy Pet Clinic to offer a Low-Cost Shot Spot Vaccination Clinic on Saturday, Aug. 2, from 8 a.m. to noon at the Civic Center, 7887 E. 60th Ave. Vaccinations and microchipping are available and cash or all major credit cards are accepted.

Services and vaccinations available for dogs include rabies (\$20), bordetella (\$25), leptospirosis (\$25), distemper/parvo (\$20), microchip (\$30), and dewormer/ pyrantel (\$5). Services and vaccinations for cats include rabies (\$20), FVRCP (\$20), feline leukemia (\$25), microchip (\$30), and dewormer/pyrantel (\$5). Pet Clinic for low-income residents

The Community Well-Being team is hosting a free Pet Clinic in partnership with the Street Dog Coalition to serve Commerce City residents who are low-income or experiencing homelessness. 



RMA Begins Its Five-Year Review Process

The U.S. Army is starting its next Five-Year Review (FYR) process for the Rocky Mountain Arsenal environmental cleanup.

FYRs are a comprehensive assessment of how the environmental cleanup program is performing and of how well it protects human health and the environment. During the review, a multiagency team evaluates if environmental standards that affect the site have changed in the past five years, whether the cleanup continues to protect public health and the environment, and whether the cleanup can be expected to remain protective in the future.

FYRs are conducted cooperatively with the EPA, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment and Adams County Health Department.

Army Consolidates Operations into Headquarters Building

The Army recently completed a renovation of its headquarters building at RMA. Located northeast of the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center, the headquarters building is visible to hikers from the Rattlesnake Hill trail.

The building improvements enabled the Army to unite all Army staff and contractors in a single building. The project also helped to improve worker and traffic safety and realize energy and operational efficiencies.

Community Questions

Does RMA contribute "forever chemicals" to local groundwater?

A The Army reviewed its records to find out whether "forever chemicals" were released at RMA. These chemicals, which are collectively known as perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), are found in everyday items like fast-food wrappers, carpets, clothing, paints, and Teflon because they help make materials resistant to stains and sticking.

At RMA, the only known PFAS releases came from a firefighting foam used twice in the late 1970s to control flammable liquid spills. Both incidents involved about 25 gallons of foam in areas already known to have contamination. These areas are upstream of groundwater treatment plants, which remove contamination before the water flows further.

Since 2017, the Army has been testing the water from these treatment plants to check for PFAS. Tests show that the treated water meets drinking water standards set by the EPA. In short, while small amounts of PFAS were released at RMA, the existing water treatment systems are working effectively to remove them.
